In celebration of Black History month, Dr. Michael E. Lomax will give a free public lecture and professional review of the recent Hollywood movie: #42: The Jackie Robinson Story. Lomax will discuss the significance that Robinson and others had not only in breaking the color line in major league baseball, but also in increasing involvement of African-Americans and Latinos in sport and culture today. Both the lecture and film will take place at Millersville University in the Student Memorial Center Multi Purpose Room at 7 p.m.

Lomax is a sport historian who has served on the faculty of the University of Iowa and University of Georgia. His primary research focus is on the African-American experience in sports and the rise of sport entrepreneurs. Lomax has written several articles on race and sport, labor relations in sport and Major League Baseball's expansion era. His book, Black Baseball Entrepreneurs 1860-1901: Operating By Any Means Necessary, examines the ways in which African-American entrepreneurs transformed baseball into a commercialized amusement.

REV. AL SHARPTON

MARTIN LUTHER KING JR. CELEBRATION

Reverend Al Sharpton is one of America's foremost leaders for civil rights battles against economic injustices, political inequity and corporate racism. For decades he has played a major role in virtually every significant move for civil liberty, community empowerment and economic equality often in the midst of controversy.



Rev. Jesse Jackson said: "When an injustice has occurred, the victims don't look for the public official with the most credentials, or the preacher with the largest church. They just call Rev. Al and they know that he'll do something about it." As founder and president of the National Action Network (NAN), Sharpton heads this nonprofit organization that fights for progressive, people-based social policies by providing extensive voter education and registration campaigns, and economic support for small community businesses. He became interested in politics, and founded the National Youth Movement (NYM) when he was only 16 years old. The NYM registered thousands of young people to vote and advocated for job training programs. Sharpton has run for political office in several unsuccessful bids: as a candidate for the New York State Senate (1978), the U.S. Senate (1992 and 1994); the mayor of New York City (1997) and the U.S. presidency (2004). Sharpton hosts "Politics Nation," a TV news program on MSNBC and a nationally syndicated radio show, "Keep it Real." A fiery and charismatic speaker known for his incisive wit and unapologetic fire, many find Sharpton an eloquent and fearless spokesman against racial prejudice and injustice.





Sonya Clark was born in Washington, D.C. to a psychiatrist from Trinidad and a nurse from Jamaica and gained an appreciation for craft and the value of handmade items primarily from her maternal grandmother who was a professional tailor. Many of her family members taught her the value of a well-told story and she values the stories held in objects.

Clark holds a MFA from Cranbrook Academy of Art, a BFA from Art Institute of Chicago, a bachelor's degree in psychology from Amherst College and a high school diploma from the Sidwell Friends School in D.C. She had the privilege of learning the craft of thinking through making from many makers throughout her travels. Her work has been exhibited in 250 museums and galleries in Europe, Africa, Asia, South America, Australia and throughout the U.S.A. She has been able to pursue her studio practice thanks to generous honors and opportunities such as a Pollock-Krasner Award, a Rockefeller Foundation Residency in Italy, a Red Gate Residency in China, a Wisconsin Arts Board Fellowship, a Virginia Commission for the Arts Fellowship, a Smithsonian Artist Research Fellowship, a Virginia Museum of Fine Arts Award, a Civitella Ranieri Fellowship in Italy, and most recently as a United States Artist Fellow.

Clark is chair of the Department of Craft/Material Studies at Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond, which is ranked as the Nation's top public university of the arts. Formerly, she was a Baldwin-Bascom Professor of Creative Arts at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Wes Moore, an Army officer and Rhodes Scholar, youth advocate and business leader, will speak about "The Transformative Power of Education."

Moore and his sisters were raised by their widowed mother. Despite early academic and behavioral struggles, he graduated Phi Theta Kappa in 1998 as a commissioned officer from Valley Forge Military College and Phi Beta Kappa from Johns Hopkins University in 2001, where he also played football and earned a bachelor's degree in international relations. He then became a Rhodes Scholar, studying international relations at Oxford University. After his studies, Moore, a paratrooper and captain in the United States Army, served a combat tour of duty in Afghanistan with the 1st Brigade of the 82nd Airborne Division. He then served as a White House Fellow to Secretary of State Condeleezza Rice. He serves on the boards of the Iraq Afghanistan Veterans of America (IAVA) and Johns Hopkins University and founded an organization called STAND! that works with Baltimore youth involved in the criminal justice system. He is committed to helping the parents, teachers, mentors and advocates who serve our nation's youth. He is the author of *The Other Wes Moore*, a New York Times bestseller. A portion of all book proceeds are being donated to City Year and the U.S. Dream Academy.
